Notice of Partisan Primary and Sample Ballots
August 9, 2022

Office of the Jackson County Clerk

To the voters of Jackson County:

Notice is hereby given of a partisan primary to be held in Jackson County on August 9, 2022, at which the nominees for the offices named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office under the appropriate party, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, if any, in the sample ballot below.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
- show an acceptable form of photo identification*
- sign the poll book**

****If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.**

****If the voter is unable to sign the poll book due to disability, a poll worker may write the word "exempt."**

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth or go to a machine and cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here.

Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understand- ing English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter. If a voter is unable to state their name and address, an assistant may also do so for the voter.

At the partisan primary, the voter shall select the party of their choice. Voting for candidates of more than one party may invalidate the ballot. The voter must cast a vote for individual candidates.

Where Optical Scan Voting is used

• If a party preference *is designated*, and votes are cast for ballot candidates of another party or write-in votes are cast in another party, only votes cast in the designated party will count.

• If a party preference *is not designated*, and votes are cast for candidates (or write-in votes are cast) in more than one party, no votes will be counted

Within the party of their choice, the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device ("Automark," Express Vote, "Clear Access" or "ImageCast Evolution (ICE)"* to mark an **optical scan** ballot, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the party of their choice. The voter shall then touch the screen at the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referen- dum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the party of their choice. The voter shall then touch the screen at the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

Spoiled Ballots

If a voter spoils a **paper or optical scan** ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a **touch screen** ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it may be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official **touch screen** ballot is marked, the voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

The Common Council met in special session at City Hall in the City of Black River Falls on July 20, 2022 at 6:00 P.M. Alderpersons Mathews, Olson, Busse, Gearing-Lancaster, Wussow, Brown, and Ammann were present. Alderperson Rave attended remotely via Zoom meetings. Mayor J. Eddy presided. It was moved by Alderperson Gearing-Lancaster, seconded by Alderperson Ammann to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the July 5, 2022 Common Council meeting. Motion carried.

CITIZENS IN ATTENDANCE

There were 9 citizens in attendance – 8 in person and one remotely via Zoom meetings.

ORDINANCE 874 – an ordinance creating Section 2.07 of the Code of Ordinances related to meetings by telephone or other communication technology was presented as a 1st reading. There was discussion and consensus to remove 2.07(c).

Ehler’s & Associates representative Sean Lentz presented the bond rating report and resolution for issuance of bonds for TID No 8. S&P Global issued a AA-rating for the city’s bond issuance.

It was moved by Alderperson Busse, seconded by Alderperson Brown to approve **RESOLUTION 2022-06** – A resolution providing for the issuance, sale, and delivery of \$2,860,000 general obligation community development bonds, Series 2022A. Motion carried. The resolution is available at City Hall.

There was lengthy discussion on a proposed amendment to Section 8.05 of the Code of Ordinances which regulates the sale or display of merchandise on streets, sidewalks, and other public places. Alderperson Mathews confirmed that the BRF Downtown Association did not have quorum and did not take up the issue. Alderperson Ammann stated he feels the displays attract customers and expressed interest in talking to the businesses and get it cleaned up a little before looking at changing an ordinance. There was consensus this issue should go to the BRF Downtown Association first. David Hatch from Karma New & Used spoke in opposition of changing the ordinance citing displays attract customers and get them to stop, sandwich boards are needed to drive traffic to side street businesses, there is plenty of room for opening doors if cars are parked in the parking stalls properly, three businesses will pull out of Black River Falls if the change is implemented, and 95% of his business comes from outside the city. Al Powell spoke in opposition of changing the ordinance citing not wanting to see more regulations and restrictions on the merchants and concerns with enforcement and the unnecessary burden that would be on the police. Bill Moe represented Moe Hardware and spoke in opposition of changing the ordinance citing how much of this seems to be directed at their store, his 60 years of experience in the downtown district, how they believe in Black River and want to stay here, the harassment they have received from this is hard to live with not to say they wouldn’t be willing to build outside of town or somewhere else, their store is a destination store that needs the displays on the sidewalk, 60% of business comes from outside of Jackson County, customers not wanting to go in to the narrow alley to pick up merchandise, displays are kept up in good order, a vendor comes in twice a month so there are no mice and rats, doesn’t understand what we are worried about if only one complaint and what is so unsightly when merchants leave items outside, they don’t have any problems with theft off these displays after hours, Laura Lindow’s coat rack is an asset to the downtown and she has stated she would not continue that if she has to take it in every night, the five privately owned benches in downtown are heavily used. There were no objections to the Mayor’s understanding that unless the BRF Downtown Association comes back with some indication they want the ordinance changed, the City would have no interest in acting upon this in any way.

There was discussion on the proposed amendment or repeal of Section 1.43 related to polling hours as polling hours are set by state statute 6.78(1m) and the current language is in conflict with that statute.

It was moved by Alderperson Busse, seconded by Alderperson Gearing-Lancaster to repeal Section 1.43 of the Code of Ordinances related to polling hours. Motion carried. An ordinance will be drafted and go through the approval process to accomplish this.

The Department Head monthly reports were reviewed. Department heads present were Greg Rush, Cara Hart, Chad Duerkop, Jeremy Isensee, Jody Stoker, and Brad Chown.

1. The Street Superintendent advised N 11th St, N 1st St, and N 2nd St are all paved.

a. It was moved by Alderperson Ammann, seconded by Alderperson Mathews to approve the request to bid out a truck for 2023 delivery. Motion carried.

b. It was moved by Alderperson Wussow, seconded by Alderperson Gearing-Lancaster to approve the request to bid out crushing of the rubble pile. Motion carried.
2. The Chief of Police had nothing further to report.

a. It was moved by Alderperson Busse, seconded by Alderperson Mathews to approve the Police Department’s Lexipol policy manual. Motion carried.

b. It was moved by Alderperson Mathews, seconded by Alderperson Brown to authorize the Chief of Police to accept or deny policy changes suggested by Lexipol. Motion carried.
3. The Parks & Recreation Director had nothing further to report.

a. It was moved by Alderperson Olson, seconded by Alderperson Wussow to approve **RESOLUTION 2022-08** – a resolution revising the 2022 Fee Schedule. Motion carried. The resolution changes the current \$150 daily rental fee for Lunda Park shelters to \$100 from 6a-1p, \$100 from 2p-11p, or \$200 for all day and is available at City Hall.

b. There was discussion on the condition of the outdoor bathrooms at the Chamber building. There was consensus to have the Parks & Recreation Director get a cost estimate on remodeling these bathrooms.
4. The City Administrator advised that we received nine responses for the Deputy Clerk/Treasurer position, it was offered to and accepted by Kelli Wood, and she will begin August 8th. The bond sale is wrapping up, SC Swiderski has closed on their financing, and emails have been moved and remote access is available again.
5. The Fire Chief advised EMS revenues should be entered next month.

It was moved by Alderperson Olson, seconded by Alderperson Mathews to approve the application for Class A Beer and Class C Wine Retailer’s Licenses from Smokers Corner at 6 Eat Main Street. Motion carried.

It was moved by Alderperson Busse, seconded by Alderperson Gearing-Lancaster to approve the application for a Temporary Class B Beer and Wine (Picnic) License for the Black River Falls Lion’s Club for the Black River Falls Fire department 150th Anniversary Celebration on August 20, 2022 at 1400 Tyler Street (Lunda Park). Motion carried.

It was moved by Alderperson Ammann, seconded by Alderperson Wussow to approve the applications for Liquor Operator’s Licenses as presented. Motion carried.

It was moved by Alderperson Mathews, seconded by Alderperson Brown to approve the vouchers for June 2022 Check #70948 - #71087 totaling \$431,039.15. Motion carried.

It was moved by Alderperson Olson, seconded by Alderperson Gearing-Lancaster to approve the City Treasurer’s Report for June 2022. Motion carried.

It was moved by Alderperson Mathews, seconded by Alderperson Wussow to approve the Revenue & Expense Reports for June 2022. Motion carried. It was moved by Alderperson Olson, seconded by Alderperson Mathews to ad-

journ. Motion Carried at 7:26 pm.

Board President Rick Paisley called the regular monthly meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Administrators present: Superintendent Jeff Arzt and Finance Administrator Casey Pfaff. Board members present: Becky Whalen, Terry Blaken, Kathy Dunn & Shane Zeman. All who were present then stood for the Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Zeman, second by Blaken, to approve the minutes from the previous meeting. Motion carried 4-0.

Correspondence: There was no correspondence.

Administrator’s Report: GEO summer school classes ran from June 6-17, 2022. There were approximately 240 students that attended and anticipating about 95 for remedial classes held later this summer.

We are on the third year of our five-year contract for milk, break and food bids. Reinhart is our prime vendor and we combine with other area districts to receive the best possible pricing for our food service program.

The district is receiving unexpected funds as a result of higher transportation aid as well as funds from an internal Medicaid audit. Recent legislation for gun safety laws will also provide more funding for mental health services for students.
